

### **MOTIVATING ADULT LEARNERS**

I recently attended a webinar provided by Literacy New York and led by Adam Springwater. Adam's presentation focused on motivation and engagement of adult learners. It was a very interesting presentation; some of my big take-aways are as follows:

- Importance of goal setting and creating plans: "A goal without a plan is just a wish." Goals should be specific, measurable, attainable, reasonable, and timely. Teachers/Case Managers should listen more than they talk in the first 15 minutes of conversation with students. Students should tell you what they need and you will help them create goals from there.
- Change is hard! Don't tell students they have to change; talk to them about making improvements, this is more encouraging and easier to buy into.
- What motivates improvement: trials and immediate needs they have, examples of others who have succeeded, competitions with others, mentors who act as guides and heroes. They look to us as their mentors; we set examples for them.

### • Types of motivation:

1. Emotional Shake Motivation: hitting a rock bottom that dramatically impacts your perceptions: fatalistic, no responsibility, entitled, low self-esteem, destructive.

- 2. Push Motivation: relies on external force, is short-term and negative, requires massive support, "Do this or else..." When you are not there to be their external force, the motivation will decrease.
- 3. Pull Motivation: relies on internal force and a person's own dreams and passion, uses self-responsibility, self-esteem, and self-awareness. We want to focus on this form of motivation, help students to set goals for themselves and short-term steps needed to accomplish those goals.
- How to find joy and contentment: focus on what you are grateful for, learn about reaping and sowing. Have a plan, focus on the current task; you get back what you
- Attribution Theory: focus on what you can control, not things outside your control.
- Success before challenge: always provide feedback that focuses on what the student did well first, then offer them a suggestion for improvement.

Overall, it was a great presentation and very useful in supporting our adult learners. I placed the slides that were shared from the presentation in our Google folder (in the 1st day/community building folder) if you would like to view them. A: Everything is my favorite part!


Q: What is something you would like to do again?

# TUTOR SPOTLIGHT: NEENAH

Neenah started volunteering with Literacy Nassau in January 2024. She and Bob P. worked as co-tutors of a level 1 class in Freeport, with each of them leading class one day a week and staying in touch to check in on students' progress. She continues to co-tutor. We thank Neenah for her dedication to her students and for piloting another option for co-tutoring where two tutors split a class and each attend once a week.



### Q: How did you get involved with Literacy Nassau?

I became involved with Literacy Nassau because I was looking for a way to be more involved with service in the community. To me, service is very important for both the student/community and the volunteer. Service and engagement facilitates growth, strength, and resilience for all involved.

### Q: Describe some of your experiences tutoring with Literacy Nassau.

The experience has been awesome! I truly mean that. The staff at Literacy Nassau and the Freeport Memorial Library are top notch. Starting with my initial email inquiry, to the training, and the support that Literacy Nassau offers – it has been a great experience as a first timer. Recently the class and I answered some questions which I turned into a grid on the white-board and it showed that we all had similarities and make similar decisions – what time we wake up, eat meals, etc. The question that really surprised us was; what do we do when we wake up? Most of us wrote "Pray." I wish I could say that I planned it, but I didn't; it just worked out.

### Q: What motivates you to keep on tutoring with us?

The students. We learn from each other. I am teaching them English, and they are teaching me French and enhancing my knowledge of the Spanish language. And I really feel good when class is over and I know that everyone learned and retained at least one new word or fact or definition.

### Q: What would you advise a new tutor just starting out with us?


Just Do It! (It's not just for sneakers. ) Seriously – I was nervous; I even called my sister Christine who is a career educator and got some tips from her. Kate and her team are always there for support. Before I started, I sat in on one class that Bob was teaching – that was helpful. But know that you have so much to offer. The students are waiting to take it all in. Sign-up, show-up, you won't regret it!

### Q: What are some of the student successes that you could highlight this session?

I think one success is the way we start each class. I ask each student how their day was and how are they feeling. And they can ask me. Everyone enjoys sharing and it allows them to use new vocabulary. Their responses evolve every Monday. Also, we recently started reading paragraphs out loud –I read and ask the students to circle words that are unfamiliar. We then write the words on the whiteboard, discuss, and define them. Everyone leaves class with quite a few new words added to their vocabulary.

### Q: What are some activities you enjoy outside of tutoring with Literacy Nassau?

Outside of tutoring, I also volunteer at a food pantry in Brooklyn on Saturday mornings. I love spending time with my family including my 2 dogs: Ewing and Oakley. Sports, reading, traveling, and keeping up with friends is always on my to-do list.
